Roscommon Gaels looking to the Future at their Forever Home in Lisnamult

GAA activities have been in Roscommon town since 1889 with Roscommon Gaels GAA club coming into existence in its current form in 1969. From the very beginning the club sought to provide Gaelic Games to all that lived in Roscommon parish and, in their long history, the club has had many homes and gone through many transitions, now finally settling in Lisnamult – their "forever home".

Unfortunately, due to Covid-19, like all every GAA club Roscommon Gaels are unable to commence any on-field Gaelic Games activities at the moment.

However, Teresa Hession, the club's current Chairperson, stated that the club has been very busy working away off field and there's no doubt the glass is always half full even in these Covid-19 times. "While we are in a most difficult time, we are making the best of it by keeping our members occupied as much as possible with exciting initiatives such as onand Strength & Conditioning athletic programmes for players as well as being engaged in the Community Assist initiatives during lockdowns." "Our pitches and facilities may be closed but off field we are busy with online meetings. A lot of time and effort has been put in over the last 12-24 months by our members and our executive to plan for the future. We have had to be innovative to deliver things in a different way in line with restrictions". For example the club's lotto draw has gone on line since early December. Again, people are very generous and are supporting the lotto in this new format for which we are very grateful.

Seamus Carthy, Assistant Chairperson also included, "Lisnamult is our home and while we miss all our club activities, we are hopeful that there will be great days there again very soon. One of the important decisions we have taken in recent times is to sell St. Coman's Park (the Lough Pitch) to Roscommon County Council and this process is at an advanced stage. The pitch is adjoining the beautiful community facility of Loughnanene park and it may be a welcome addition to this wonderful public park that has been so important for our community's health and wellbeing in these Covid-19 times."

The infrastructure development of Lisnamult Grounds began in 2002 when it the club purchased 9.5 acres of land and installed a floodlit main pitch. In the years that followed, training pitches were developed and 4 dressing rooms were built (c/w with a sustainable energy water heating system) and

electronic scoreboard installed. A hugely successful fundraiser "Win a Subaru" was run in the Club in 2020. The proceeds of this fundraiser are ring fenced to improve car park and sports wall surface facilities in Lisnamult. Subject to Covid-19 restrictions, the club is hopeful this project will come out of the ground this year. This development will further enhance the existing facilities with our investment to date in excess of €1 million in Lisnamult. Club Secretary, John Donnellan said "This is a phenomenal amount of money raised by the club members to provide our club, our schools and our community with such fine facilities. The development of our grounds in Lisnamult continues apace. So as the saying goes, a lot done but more to do!"

Our progressive club continues to grow and so the 9.5 acres in now not enough to accommodate all the teams we have to cater for. Some of the current pressure on facilities in Lisnamult is relieved by the Hyde Centre and the front training pitch at the Hyde. We are also delighted to see that the Hyde stadium upgrade is being done by Roscommon County Board.

Teresa Hession said "Ultimately however, we recognise that our home is Lisnamult and this is where we want to develop all of our facilities to further enhance and nurture the great club spirit that Roscommon Gaels has fostered. We consider it essential that our club house, all our playing facilities and community services must be in one location to ensure the optimum development of our GAA club".

Hession went onto to say "In preparation for the year ahead we have appointed all the managers of our club adult teams and most of our underage teams have their managements in place also. They are all rearing to get going when it is safe to do so and Covid-19 restrictions are lifted. We are delighted to have club members in all the adult team manager positions which is a testament to the loyalty and drive in Roscommon Gaels that people of such calibre have put themselves forward to take these teams for the 2021 season. Declan Hoare is the senior football manager and he replaces Liam Mc Neill at the helm of this group after his six incredible and dedicated years as senior manager. Decie is assisted by Shane O'Donnell, John Nolan and Kevin Stritch. Pat Clancy remains as senior hurling manager for his second year and he has Liam Casey and David Hoare as his selectors. Mick Byrne and Francie Hoare are the Junior football managers for the coming season and will be aiming to build on the progression of our two junior teams in 2020 in the coming year. Paul Biesty is the Junior Ladies football team manager and will, no doubt, be keen to build on the success of last's year appearance in the

Junior C Co. Final. Tom O'Farrell is, once again, the Ros Gaels Junior camogie manager and is also looking forward to the season after winning the Junior B title in 2020. We want to thank all our coaches and managers for stepping into these roles and the best of luck to them all for the coming season".

So it is onwards and upwards for Roscommon Gaels club as they continue to develop, contribute to the community of Roscommon Town and provide the best possible facilities to progress all our teams. Ni Neart le Cur Le Cheile.



Lisnamult Development Update

The last twelve months in the Parks Committee has been very productive from a Club Development perspective. A few more valuable members helping out in the Parks Committee are Pat Connolly, Declan Hunt, Pat Clancy and Kevin King.

Some of the highlights:-

 Last year Lisnamult grounds took a step forward with the knocking of the old house to free up extra space which was vital during those busy evenings.

- We submitted successful planning applications which were successfully granted for lights on the training pitch, a carpark with two entrances and an Astro pitch in the carpark area.
- Ground works completed for the installation of three new training pitch lights once restrictions allow. This will provide more valuable training time for the 2021 season.
- New nets were installed for the training pitch
- Lighting provisions completed for the carpark lighting.
- Two storage containers were installed to provide necessary storage of equipment.



Lastly but no least, an update on the carpark and Astro/Car Park Development?

The Astro/Car Park Development in Lisnamult cannot proceed at the moment due to restrictions on non-essential construction. The Club Executive has decided to use this time wisely to consider a wider view of how we progress infrastructure projects in Lisnamult. The Parks & Development Committee are tasked with devising and considering strategic upgrade works for the

club. We are heading into a quite extensive level of Club Development and it is the club's ambition to maximise the facilities for generations to come.

We recognise the gravity of these works, the level of investment that will be required and what it means to our club, our members and our community as a whole. We are conscious people fundraised last year, and we need to deliver a project correctly. Therefore, we are taking the time to completely review the overall development plan, for the grounds, for carparking, access to the facility, Health & Safety, Astro Pitch, playing pitches etc. The current Covid restrictions have allowed us to complete this extensive exercise that we believe will serve us very well as we progress with the overall Development Objectives of Roscommon Gaels.

Roscommon Gaels has enjoyed great growth in our members in recent years, the club is getting bigger every year and we need to develop our facilities in-line with our growth. It is our aim to have this planning exercise completed in the coming weeks so we can proceed with the first phase of works.



Coaching & Games Update

In accordance with the law, GAA and Roscommon Gaels policy, any volunteer in the GAA intending to work with children, **must have completed the following courses.**

- 1. Garda Vetting 2. GAA Child Safeguarding 1
- 3. The GAA Foundation Award at minimum

Garda Vetting must be completed every

five years. In the GAA any person who carries out a role of responsibility such as coaching, managing or training underage teams or indeed adult teams that contain any player under 18 years of age must be vetted.

Roscommon Gaels Camogie



After a few weeks of touch and go, a new Roscommon Camogie County Board is to be formed. All camogie clubs must be affiliated to the Camogie Association through their own county board in order to operate. Thankfully, some dedicated people from around the county are stepping up to take on roles at county board level so that all our young girls and women will be able to play camogie in 2021. Roscommon Camogie will Gaels Club have representatives on the county board - Patricia Torpey will take on the role of Vice-Chair while Tom O'Farrell will take on the role of Connaught Delegate.

Of course, restrictions around Covid-19 will dictate when and if we will be able to take to the field at all this year. Our camogie coaches have been getting a well-deserved rest after all the hard work they put in in 2020 between Covid-19 health questionnaires, sanitising equipment, keeping records of attendance for contact tracing, organising training sessions, organising matches, communicating with parents and players. It was hell for leather for a time during our much condensed 2020 season. Luckily, each age group (U8, U10, U12, U14, U16, U18, Junior) had a great team of coaches, assistants and Covid-19 supervisors, who generously gave of their time to the club. Now a small stretch is being noticed in the evenings and our coaches minds are already turning to the season ahead. We will have to wait until restrictions are lifted of course but hopefully you will all encourage your girls to get out to puck a ball against a wall, practice their skills, go for a jog, do some stretches, etc., so that when the season begins our teams can be out of the blocks fast.

All coaches must meet three essential requirements under Child Protection/Safeguarding rules, i.e. garda vetting, safeguarding course, foundation coaching course. In 2020, all our coaches were garda vetted and had completed a safeguarding course. Most but not all coaches had previously completed foundation coaching courses and some coaches had completed Award 1 and

Award 2 coaching courses. Unfortunately, foundation coaching courses were suspended in 2020 due to Covid-19 restrictions. This year we are delighted to welcome a small number of new volunteer coaches. For anyone who has not completed a Child Protection/Safeguarding course, a 2-hour course will be available online on 15th March. Coaching sounds like a lot of work in an already busy life. However, it is a great way to be involved in your child's and other children's sporting lives, a great way to make new friends and to have fun, exercise and craic. Let's face it we could all do with a bit more of that.

If anyone has any interesting, quirky, fun photos showing your camogie skill, activity, interest, event, we'd be grateful if you would forward to our PRO below who will get it included in the club newsletter.

Some initiatives the camogie club is hoping to progress in 2021, restrictions permitting, involve short (6-10 week) programmes aimed at goalkeeping for younger girls and strength and conditioning for players from U16 upwards. These plans are on hold for now but depending on what will lie ahead of us from March or so, we may get to run these programmes at that stage.



Martin Fogarty Hurling & Camogie Workshops

Another great Hurling Workshop took place on Jan the 25th by Martin Fogarty (National Hurling Development Manager) and Damien Coleman (Connacht Hurling Development Manager) via Teams.

Some key highlights from the Webinar:

- The 3 most important words for any Club Coach is <u>Enthusiasm</u>, <u>Enthusiasm</u>, <u>Enthusiasm</u>. It's infectious and kids pick up on it.
- Watch out for kids not having the Hand Lock Grip on the hurl i.e. The 2 hands must be touching each other when holding the hurl and striking.

Community of Practice: Arrange a meeting once a month from the Coaching Officer on Top 5 points that the Hurling Coaches can focus on i.e. Where areas can be improved upon. https://learning.gaa.ie/AccreditedAnalysts

Bio Banding is vitally important i.e. having players of the same ability playing with and against each other. In other words, don't regress quality players by putting them marking players they're more physically and skilfully superior to. It does not develop either player.

Martin Fogarty Hurling & Camogie Webinars - 2021

The Club Coach

This workshop is a general introduction to coaching and is ideal for new or intended coaches. It might also encourage those who have been coaching for a while to reflect on their practices. The workshop will look at the various challenges that a coach will encounter and will offer advice on how to meet these challenges. The ever-important question on "what exactly to coach" will be addressed as will various organizational approaches.

Coaching Children

This is a practical based workshop using videos, advising on what exactly to coach when you go to the pitch. Organization and planning of a season & individual session will be discussed as will various challenges that the coach may encounter.

Coaching Youths-Adults

Similar to "Coaching Children" and again using videos to replace the practical element, this workshop will explore a little deeper into what a coach might consider bringing to the pitch in order to give his/her players and team the best opportunity to play to their potential. The focus will be on Skills, Games and Elements of the game.

Managing a Hurling Team

Managing a team can be a very broad and varied role. The workshop looks at the key areas management of giving advice and recommendations on how to approach the position in structured manner. а Responsibilities, Planning, Values and Manager Attributes are all discussed together with a suggested "Road Map" on how to get started. The workshop is based on managing an adult team but can be tailored back to suit underage teams. The basic values are the same, regardless of the team you might be working with. This workshop is best taken in conjunction with one of the above - Coaching Children or Coaching Youths/Adults


Improving your Team

This workshop takes an "Eagle Eye" approach to looking at your team and players with view to eradicating common errors and shortcomings that ultimately result in games being lost that could possibly have been won. The approach is quite simple and basic and really just involves opening our eyes as coaches and seeing what is in front of them. Video will be used to complement some of the observations made.

Hurling & Camogie in the Primary School

This workshop is basically a "crash course on hurling/camogie" aimed particularly at Teachers who may never have even picked up a hurl in their lives. It aims to demystify the coaching of hurling/camogie and will look at introducing and working on the basics of the game in an enjoyably and friendly environment. The workshop will use video to give participants practical examples of what to do with their children at various levels, from total beginner to "expert" in the school hall, yard or field so that they can enjoy this wonderful game with their Teacher and friends.
